Students completing the Associate of Applied Science (AAS) in Cosmetology and Salon Management will gain the skills needed to own their own business or manage another business. The skills and emphasis areas include Accounting, Finance/Financial Management, Marketing, Management, Legal, Communication and Public Speaking.

Cosmetology is the study and application of beauty treatment. Cosmetologists provide personal care services that include caring for people's hair, skin, and nails. Beauty professionals employed in the cosmetology industry include hair stylists, barbers, and estheticians, also called skin care specialists.

### B. How does this CE Program fit into the overall educational program?

The CE program provides a well-defined curriculum that includes rigorous content, scope, and sequence, in the field of Cosmetology and Salon Management. The program meets the goal of diverse educational opportunities for students to pursue secondary and career options by providing students the opportunity to earn college credits towards an associate degree. This pathway provides students with the academic and technical skills that are essential for today's business world.
