### **New Charter School Application Process**

In alignment with the Colorado Charter School Act 22-30.5-107 (b):

The local board of education shall receive and review all applications for charter schools. If the local board of education does not review a charter application, it shall be deemed to have denied the charter application.

The Douglas County School District welcomes high-quality charter applications on an annual basis, with letters of intent due on March 1, and full applications submitted through CHARTER TOOLS between March 1 and March 15 annually.



### **2023 DCSD Charter Applications**

In March of 2023, DCSD Choice Programming received 8 applications from charter schools (ASI in four locations, JDI embedded into each)

- 6. John Dewey Institute (JDI) Sterling Ranch
- 7. John Dewey Institute (JDI) Crystal Valley
- 8. John Dewey Institute (JDI) Highlands Ranch

In accordance with <u>CO Charter Schools Act</u> 22-30.5-107: *The local Board of Education shall rule by resolution on the application ... within ninety days after receiving the application.* 

# New Charter School Application Process Colorado Charter School Act 22-30.5-106.

The Checklist for a Comprehensive Application will be used by both the applicant and DCSD to monitor the completeness of the application. The Evaluation Criteria provides DCSD with means of determining the quality of the application component, but may also be used by the applicant when targeting a high-quality school program. The required components of the application are as follows:

- **B** Vision and Mission Statements
- **C Goals, Objectives and Pupil Performance Standards**
- **D** Evidence of Support
- **E Educational Program**
- F Plan for Evaluating Pupil Performance
- **G** Budget and Finance
- H Governance
- I Employees
- J Insurance Coverage
- **K Parent and Community Involvement**

- L Enrollment Policy
- **M** Transportation and Food Service
- N Facilities
- O Waivers
- P Student Discipline, Expulsion, or Suspension
- **Q** Serving Students with Special Needs
- **R Dispute Resolution Process**
- **S School Management Contracts**



#### **Staff Recommendation**

# Recommendation to <u>Deny</u> the applications for ASI in all four proposed locations

- The proposed budgets for ASI are dependent on Notices of Claim that have been reported as "submitted" but have not been "approved."
- The DCSD Long Range Planning Committee (LRPC) has not identified land parcels in the applications as surplus, therefore this land is not available for charter schools.
- There are extremely low (3) letters of intent that have been submitted and/or collected (unverified).
- The proposed Governance structure is not at arms-length. There is no evidence of a school Board of Directors, or a viable Charter Management Organization (CMO).
- The financial viability of the school is dependent on a claim made to the Colorado School District Self Insurance Pool (CSDSIP).
- The school application only included one person, and there were no others represented (either in person or virtually) in any meeting, presentation, or interview.





#### **Staff Recommendation**

# Recommendation to <u>Deny</u> the applications for JDI in all four proposed locations

- The DCSD Long Range Planning Committee (LRPC) has not identified land parcels in the applications as surplus, therefore this land is not available for charter schools.
- There are extremely low (2) letters of intent that have been submitted and/or collected (unverified).
- The proposed Governance structure is not at arms-length. There is no evidence of a school Board of Directors, or a viable Charter Management Organization (CMO), and the Governing Board does not have a clear line of authority over the CMO.
- Douglas County Schools has approximately 900 students identified as students with autism indicating that almost every student in DCSD with autism would need to enroll at JDI schools to fulfill enrollment.
- The financial viability of the school is dependent on a claim made to the Colorado School District Self Insurance Pool (CSDSIP).
- The school application only included one person, and there were no others represented (either in person or virtually) in any meeting, presentation, or interview.
